USE OF COOKIES

A "cookie" is a string of information which assigns you a unique identifier that we store on your computer. Your browser then provides that unique identifier to use each time you submit a query to the Site. We use cookies on the Site to keep track of traffic on the site, which we use to track visitors and popular content.

Cookies help us understand how the Site is being used and help us improve the user's experience.

TYPES OF COOKIES

We use Cookies for the operation and security of the site and to improve our services. The following types of cookies are used when you visit our Site:

PREFERENCE COOKIES

Preference cookies enable a website to remember information that changes the way the website behaves or looks, like your preferred language or the region that you are in.

CFTOKEN COOKIES

This cookie is used to determine which type of devise the visitor is using, so the website can be properly formatted. This information is stored in the "CFID" cookie.

STATISTIC COOKIES

Statistic Cookies help website owners to understand how visitors interact with websites by collecting and reporting information anonymously.

CFID COOKIES

This cookie is used in context with the Cftoken cookie. The cookie stores a specific ID for the visitor and the visitor's devise and browser. It is used to track a single visitor around the site, and is formally used to manage Member and Administrator login and manage their authenticated sessions once they login. CFID and CFTOKEN are used together to do this.
